A NOTHER milestone in the eventful career of the Eoan Group was passed with overwhelming success when it opened its opera and ballet season before the wildly enthusiastic audience which filled the City Hall last night. The production of Mascagni's "Cavalleria Rusticana" was a colossal feat for a cast of singers, many of whom had learnt the music and its Italian words laboriously note by note. Added to this was the task of acting convincingly each of its separate rô es.

Unbounded enthusiasm on the part of the singers, and unlimited patience expended on their training by Joseph Manca (their musical director), Gregorio Fiascanaro (their producer) and Vincent Costello (their chorus-master) were rewarded by the result achieved last night.

Chorus work was excellent throughout, and for sheer volume of tone the Easter Hymn has never been equalled here. The orchestra, unfortunately, suffered all through the evening (except in the Intermezzo) by too much volume of sound from trombones, trumpets and timpani.
